About us: Aroostook RSVP (Retired and Senior Volunteer Program) helps promote healthy, productive aging among people age 55 and older by providing rewarding service opportunities within their own community. RSVP matches the interests, skills, and lifelong experiences of volunteers to meet a variety of critical local needs through non-profit agencies and public organizations. Aroostook RSVP is sponsored by the Aroostook Agency on Aging.

Impact on Maine Communities: 471 Aroostook RSVP Volunteers served 53,308 hours during the year ending March 31, 2020.

- Food Pantry Volunteers distributed over 68,000 lbs. of food to County residents.
- Meals on Wheels volunteers delivered 34,847 meals to 421 homebound older adults.
- Friendly Visitor volunteers connected with 65 isolated older adults.
- Bone Builders/Matter of Balance volunteers helped to improve the wellness of 260 older adults.

We have surpassed our volunteer goals and have 14 volunteer coaches to conduct A Matter of Balance classes in all areas of our county. 52 area older adults successfully completed the class. Due to the increased aging population in our county and the reality of expense/detriment created by falls, this program continues to grow in importance. Participants have very positive experiences with the classes and reported feeling empowered, stronger, less isolated and less fearful of falling.

Our Bone Builders program is extremely successful. We had 14 locations that were holding biweekly classes. We surveyed all Bone Builders participants in February 2020 and received overwhelming positive results and comments. Responses to the survey show 91% increased range of motion, 89% increased flexibility and improved muscle strength, 93% improved balance, and 95% increased confidence in movement. Also, of those that reported having had a Bone Density Scan before starting Bone Builders, and having a repeat scan done recently, 96% had improved or stabilized Bone Density.

Limestone, St Louis Food Pantry

We surpassed our target goal by serving 2724 individuals. We had 140 volunteers serving in 14 different food pantries throughout Aroostook County. We continue to see a great need for food pantries in our area and expect it to expand even more due to Covid-19. In surveys conducted in February 2020, 84% of individuals reported they could not afford nutritious meals and 88% did not have enough money to buy enough food. The majority also reported skipping meals or eating less because of lack of money for food. We will continue to provide support for our current food pantries and offer our support to additional food pantries in our area.

At Penquis our mission is to assist individuals and families in preventing, reducing, or eliminating poverty in their lives and, through partnerships, to engage the community in addressing economic and social needs.

Penquis RSVP serves Knox, Waldo and Lincoln County Food Pantries and Soup Kitchens with RSVP Senior Volunteers.

Impact on Maine Communities: The RSVP Senior volunteers focus on Food Insecurity in our communities. Working with 10 Food Pantries and Soup Kitchens, our 110 volunteers help to fight food insecurity for our neighbors in need.



Each month, our RSVP volunteers help 465 unduplicated families and 1450 unduplicated individuals to have food on their plates every day.

We know the need is more than we serve and we continue to reach out into our communities to let them know our volunteers are ready to help them.

Our volunteers serve in the following communities in Knox County: Rockland, Thomaston, Camden, Warren, Union, and residents in neighboring communities.

They also serve in Jefferson in Lincoln County and Northport in Waldo County.

Knox County Gleaners volunteers work alongside RSVP volunteers to get fresh food grown in local fields into our food recipients hands during the growing season. Being able to hand someone a fresh picked head of lettuce instead of a bag with mark down stickers from the grocery store not only provides more nutrition and a healthy vegetable, but it decreases the stigma of the food pantry and increases the dignity of the recipient.



During the Covid-19 pandemic our food pantries all continued to distribute food in a safe manor to our recipients. Working outside in all weather, food is delivered to recipients trunks ensuring physical distancing for all.

Outreach to the community has increased to let people know we are open and there is plenty of food for everyone, no matter what your family situation is. In Rockland at AIO Food Pantry they have taken on a Summer Lunch Kit available to all to make 5 days of kid's lunch, along with the regular food distribution.

About us: Penquis assists individuals and families in preventing, reducing or eliminating poverty in their lives, and, through partnerships, engages the community in addressing economic and social needs.

The **Foster Grandparent Program** places volunteers age 55 years of age or older in public or nonprofit settings, such as schools, hospitals, correctional institutions, and child care centers, to serve as role models, mentors, and tutors to children and youth with exceptional needs. Among other activities, they review schoolwork, reinforce values, teach parenting skills to young parents, and care for premature infants and children with disabilities.

Impact on Maine Communities: The Foster Grandparent Program is sponsored by Penquis in 14 of Maine's 16 counties. In 2019/2020, 70 Penquis Foster Grandparents served at 66 sites, contributing 60,746 hours of service to support the individual needs of 227 children and provide mentoring for more than 1,539 children. With assistance provided by Foster Grandparents:

- Elementary school children demonstrate improvement in a number of areas, including academic performance, self-esteem and self-confidence;
- Preschool and day care children demonstrate improvement in such areas as school readiness, cognitive skills, self-confidence, social skills and classroom behavior;
- ESL students achieve language goals and increase their self-esteem, classroom participation and self-confidence in English skills; and
- Youth who are disabled or developmentally delayed increase their communication/ language skills, interpersonal/social skills, self-help skills, attention span, overall selfesteem and sense of well-being.

"Blue Hill Consolidated is so lucky to have a Foster Grandparent in our school community. Marian has become a predictable, cheerful presence here over the past two years. She arrives promptly each day in time to greet students in the cafeteria where she has a large group of children vying for a spot near her. About Us:

UMaineCenter on Aging RSVP members, age 55 and older, invest their skills and life experiences to make a difference for generations in Eastern Maine through volunteer service.

Sites:

Our service area covers Hancock, Penobscot, Piscataquis, and Washington Counties. Communities currently being served include the following: Bangor, Bar Harbor, Blue Hill, Brewer, Bucksport, Dedham, Deer Isle, Dover-Foxcroft, Ellsworth, Hampden, Lubec, Milbridge, Millinocket, Newport, Old Town, Orono, Southwest Harbor, Sullivan, and Veazie

Impact on Maine Communities:

As a community outreach program under the auspices of the University of Maine Center on Aging, RSVP in 2019 had 89 volunteers providing approximately 11,000 hours of service to children and older adults.

- RSVP volunteers in the "Let's Read, Let's Grow" program read aloud to 250 children in early child
 care centers and Head Start programs. Sites also received free high-quality children's books for
 their libraries or distribution to children.
- RSVP volunteers participated in assisting with the home delivery of meals to those who are home-bound and assisted with the distribution of food for those in need through Commodity Supplemental Food programs to approximately 300 seniors.
- RSVP volunteers led senior exercise classes to support bone health, strength, flexibility, and balance along with Fall Prevention education through free Bone Builders and Tai Chi for Arthritis classes to 187 participants. These programs, in a dozen locations, help seniors stay active and healthy, as well to age in place more successfully.
- RSVP volunteers through Adult Day Services provided needed respite for 31 of those caring for loved ones with dementia and other cognitive impairments.

RSVP During Covid-19:

20 % of the program volunteers continued to serve

- Volunteers in the Commodity Supplemental Food Program continued to serve from March to the present using safety protocols and masks supplied by RSVP.
- One Bone Builders class was run by Zoom with most of its participants. Another Zoom class will be starting soon.
- Some adult day service volunteers came back in June but are serving fewer clients in a very controlled group situation.
- We are exploring virtual volunteer opportunities.

About Us: Helping older adults stay independent can be a challenge in Maine's rural areas. Many older adults are isolated and do not have relatives living nearby to visit on a regular basis and must rely on others to help assist them. Through the University of Maine Center on Aging Senior Companion Program, homebound older adults are able to maintain their independence by living in place longer thanks to regular visits from Senior Companion Volunteers who are dedicated, active individuals age 55 and older. Senior Companion Volunteers must have incomes not exceeding 200% of the poverty guideline, and receive a \$3 per hour stipend for their service.

Impact on Maine Communities:



Between July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020, Senior Companions:

- served over 260 homebound clients
- provided a total of *43,007 volunteer hours
- traveled *114,646 miles
- provided *4,762 client trips
- attended 2,005 hours of training
- engaged in *15,667 visits.

Of these visits, 5,219 were "Phone Visits" between


March 16 and June 30, 2020. *As a result of COVID-19, totals are estimated to be 25% below average due to the Suspension of in-home visits starting March 16, 2020. It is during this time period where Senior Companions transitioned from face-to-face engagement to phone contact only. Our goal is to continue with this process until state and federal CDC guidelines indicate other activities are deemed safe for the volunteers and the homebound older Mainers with underlying health conditions that places them at a higher risk level.

Local communities benefit: For the time period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020, Senior Companions received a total of \$185,964.95 in stipends. Individuals who participate as Senior Companions also benefit physically and mentally by staying involved in their communities.

<u>Sites:</u> The UMaine Center on Aging Senior Companion Program currently serves 10 Maine Counties: Oxford, Androscoggin, Kennebec, Franklin, Somerset, Waldo, Hancock, Washington, Piscataquis and Penobscot. Senior Companions currently serving are from thirty-seven cities and towns: Auburn, Bangor, Bar Harbor, Beals, Brewer, Brooks, Calais, Cambridge, Canaan,

Carthage, Cherryfield, Chesterville, Corinna, Detroit, Dexter, East Machias, Eastport, Farmington, Greene, Harrington, Hartland, Jonesboro, Lewiston, Madison, Milford, Newport, Norridgewock, Norway, Orrington, Palmyra, Parkman, Patten, Pembroke, Robbinston, South Paris, Waterville, and West Farmington. Between July 1, 2019 thru June 30, 2020, Senior Companions served 260 clients from over 78 Maine cities and towns. The Senior Companion Program has 18 community Volunteer Stations located at non-profit organizations who assist in the oversight of local Senior Companions.

As a research center with a strong focus on community engagement, the Center on Aging has moved to meet the needs of older Mainers that have arisen from the Coronavirus pandemic. Building Connection Through Letters of Positivity and Hope Collaboration between Center on Aging and UMaine students supports connection during pandemic. Jennifer Crittenden, Associate Director, recently worked with Gerontology Certificate and social work students to prepare letters of positivity and hope that were shared with over 400 older adults statewide through our Senior Companion Program, RSVP, and a local assisted living facility. Several older adult recipients have sent letters back to our students expressing their gratitude and, in turn, shared positive thoughts with our students.

The program thus far, in FY 19/20 has had 872 volunteers who have provided 'help and hope' to many, from our 24 different programs; who provide essential needs services of all kinds to both children and adults all across the State of Maine. For example:

- From our Food Banks in Aroostook who will 'on some days' serve 2,000 meals in one day, to our Child Care Development Center in York County who take special care of babies, and toddlers while mom and dad are at work, our volunteers helped nearly 50,000 of our neediest neighbors last year. In our SEARCH RSVP Kennebec & Somerset County area (Senior Corps) programs alone, in 2019, we managed 173 volunteers who served 14,663 hours. And we also have 165 seniors receiving services, from our SEARCH program/volunteers all around Maine; both programs serve seniors' needs in 106 towns around the state.
- We come to the aid of people suffering from mental illness, those who have emergency services needs' through our Relief and Hope phone line and provide essential shopping and companionship for seniors or those with disabilities who need extra care and help to live independently in their homes.
- We provide places for interns to gain valuable experience and college credit at our Refugee and Immigration Services offices (for legal, case management, cultural orientations, student mentors, American Friends, and Older Refugee Companions), or at our Jessie Albert Dental Center – who host dental externs each semester. We host about 60 to 75 interns yearly for short projects, a few months, or for example at our Behavioral Health – clinical program for the entire year.

Masks and gloves are being used by staff, volunteers and clients, and physical distancing is being practiced by all.

 - Grocery Shopping, Errands & Pharmacy Deliveries
 - Physically distanced critical transportation (limited to only highly critical with maximum distance in vehicle and PPE)

About us: RSVP's mission is to provide meaningful volunteer opportunities for adults and to serve communities by utilizing the talents, expertise and life-long experiences of older adult volunteers. RSVP recruits volunteers age 55+ to serve in non-profits and health care organizations. Southern Maine Agency on Aging (SMAA) has been the sponsor for RSVP in Cumberland and York counties since 1973. As part of the Volunteer Generation Fund Grant through Volunteer Maine, SMAA has fully adopted the Service Enterprise (SE) initiative. The purpose of the SE model is to provide meaningful opportunities that utilize volunteers' skills and abilities while matching them with fulfilling opportunities. In the last year, eight SMAA programs have developed and implemented volunteer leadership roles using the SE model.

Impact on Maine Communities: Last year, 515 RSVP volunteers donated 33,967 hours of service or the equivalent of 16 full-time employees with a value of \$779,075 (based on Independent Sector value of Maine volunteers). In 2019, RSVP Volunteers:

- Delivered over 176,000 meals to home-bound older adults
- Worked with over 50 older adults to help pay bills and balance their budgets through Money Minders program.
- Helped 412 adults reduce risk and fear of falls through Agewell Workshops
- Helped more than 2,600 Medicare beneficiaries make informed choices about their healthcare coverage.

Since COVID-19, and with additional support from the Volunteer Generation Fund, RSVP Volunteers:

- Connected with over 80 homebound clients through the Phone Pal program
- Participated in the Tech Pal program which supplies tablets to older adults to help reduce social isolation
- Enrolled in SMAA's A Volunteer Emergency Response Team (AVERT) allowing us to continue meeting the increased demand for Meals on Wheels from 750 clients to over 1,100 clients
- Coordinated a mask distribution program for volunteers and clients

Following is a testimony from one of SMAA's Phone Pal Volunteers:

I want to acknowledge the amazing work that the SMAA provides to seniors, adults with disabilities and care providers in our community. SMAA/MOW is so vital for the many people who rely on your services. For the last three years I have served as a volunteer Phone Pal to four individuals all with unique personalities and abilities but who are joined with the common need for nourishment and companionship. In my experience, the folks desperate for SMAA/MOW care are people who live alone without family and friends who

for nourishment and companionship. In my experience, the folks desperate for SMAA/MOW care are people who live alone without family and friends who take part in their lives or who are unable to physically or remotely provide support. I call my current pal three times a week for about an hour each visit, and in addition, I Facebook message her daily. My Phone Pal is lonely and depressed and frequently admits that if it were not for my calls and messages, she would "not get out of bed." She calls me her "best friend" and with our mutual love of knitting, I am encouraging her to pick up her needles again. I urge my Phone Pal to eat at least two meals a day - and sometimes I am successful. Without SMAA/MOW I cannot bear to think how my Phone Pal would be spending her days. I wanted to thank you for doing all you do - you truly make a difference. Thank

Learning Loss Prevention Programming

June 8, 2020 we opened Early Childcare Camp, Summer Enrichment Camp, and Day Camp Tracy three weeks early to serve over 200 youth daily with a focus on learning loss prevention. Through this coming school year we are partnering with:



- Colby College Civic Engagement to provide college-aged mentors, tutors, and educational seminars for ASP youth daily
- Sum Camp: Numeracy through Art and Performance founder and staff to provide basic mathematics and number fluency skills through an innovative mix of movement, theatre, music, art and mathematical play
- Boys & Girls Clubs of America's Summer Brain Gain, Summer Brain Gain Read! and STEM Modules to teach common core standards in elementary, middle and high schools through fun, themed activities.
- Teen Fit For Life Program created to bridge growing educational gap by including: tutoring, fitness, garden to table food growing, prep & cooking skills, leadership, SAT preparation, career, fiduciary & driving skills, restorative programs and more.











Summer 2020

WindowDressers is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization whose mission is to bring volunteers together to improve the warmth and comfort of homes, lower heating costs, and reduce CO2 emissions by producing low-cost insulating window inserts that function as interior mounted storm windows. Between 25 and 35% of our window inserts are provided to low-income households at no cost. WindowDressers serves communities throughout Maine and has expanded into Vermont.

WindowDressers staff supplies, trains, and supports teams of community volunteers as they fabricate affordable insulating window inserts at community-based workshops. Each community has a leadership team that manages their regional program. Our Maine Community Workshops take place in both urban and rural communities, and span from Wells to Machias and Jackman to Dover-Foxcroft. We have seen a significant growth in our outreach to low-income people of color and immigrant populations in both Portland and Lewiston. During our 2019-20 workshop season we completed 7,915 inserts, 35% of which went to low income people at no cost.

Research at the University of Maine demonstrates that **WindowDressers inserts save 1-2** gallons of heating fuel per square foot of insert per year, depending on the quality and installation of the pre-existing window. Based on this, we estimate that the nearly 42,515 inserts we've built since 2010 have prevented over 1 million gallons of heating fuel from being burned.

In addition to building window inserts, we build community. Each year, over 1,000 volunteers engage in tens of thousands of hours of community volunteer work through WindowDressers. Insert recipients participate in the building of their own and their neighbors' inserts at Community Workshops where diverse residents work together toward a common purpose.

While the Covid-19 pandemic has forced us to pause operations for now, we anticipate **significant future growth**. We will be restructuring our manufacturing process and moving to a new production facility when we resume our outreach, and are currently in the process of integrating our various uses of technology for greater efficiency. Mission: To raise aspirations using Positive Youth Development and mentoring.

Impact on Maine Communities: The Game Loft AmeriCorps Program is sponsored by Maine Youth Alliance dba the Game Loft and I Know ME programs. In 2019, 250 youth between the ages of 6 and 18 were served by Maine Youth Alliance programs having the following impacts:

- In 2019 the Game Loft **decreased food insecurity in youth** by serving meals four days a week for 50 weeks a year for a total of **3,907 meals**.
- In 2019 the Game Loft decreased social isolation to 250 youth by providing mentoring and recreation services 50 weeks per year for a total of 1750 hours of service.
- In 2019 the I Know ME program prevented school failure and dropping out of school for 20 students in RSU 3.
- In 2019 the I Know ME program established a mechanism for preventing the brain drain from rural Maine by increasing the knowledge and pride of place for 20 students in rural Waldo County and demonstrating to those youth opportunities for life and service in Maine.
- In 2019 I Know ME and Game Loft strengthened community involvement in youth by facilitating the delivery of 1426.50 hours of youth volunteering and 2133.50 hours of adult volunteering in Waldo County, Washington County, and Piscataguis County

Two short stories of impactful service:



"Garry" asked for seconds one day during a lunch lesson about Aroostook potatoes. He said, "I come from a family of 13 and we never get seconds." We feed kids like "Garry" a nutritious meal and snack every day because in this land of plenty no child should go hungry.



Maine Youth Alliance runs the I Know ME program that works with cohorts of 11 students beginning in 7th grade and going through 12th grade. The purpose of this program is to raise aspirations in rural youth, to help them understand their value in the Maine economy and culture, and to prevent the brain drain from rural Maine. "Davy" is 16 and has been with I Know ME for three years. He has multiple Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) that may lead to serious problems in adulthood. By working with trained mentors and a supportive cohort of peers he has begun to imagine his adult life in Maine. Three years ago he was failing in school and in life and now he excels. He says, "I used to think that nothing mattered very much, especially me. Now I see that I can be a servant leader, the kind of person who leads by inspiring others. I am striving, resourceful, and kind, which is what Maine is known for and I plan to contribute my best to my home state."







Everyone deserves the opportunity to enjoy time outdoors. When people have meaningful experiences with nature, their quality of life, health, and social well-being improve, and in turn their communities become stronger and more sustainable.

The Skowhegan AmeriCorps Outdoor Recreation Program (Skowhegan Outdoors) is working to increase outdoor recreation participation in the Skowhegan community by ensuring that everyone has equitable access to the outdoors, opportunities to attend free outdoor activities, and the tools and gear to experience the natural world on their own.

About us: The Maine Conservation Corps (MCC) was established by Maine's Governor and Legislature in 1983 and has since recruited and placed thousands of members who have accomplished natural resource projects all over Maine. As an AmeriCorps National Service Program, our mission is to accomplish conservation initiatives that inspire people and enhance communities.

Impact on Maine Communities: MCC is housed in the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry through the Bureau of Parks and Lands. Some of our member's accomplishments in 2019 included:

- Serving a collective total of **50,814.75 hours** on conservation projects in Maine, the equivalent of **5.8 years**
- Recruiting 698 community volunteers who completed 3,034.25 hours of service
- Creating or improving **241.2 miles of trail** throughout the state
- Engaging the public in **206 educational events** and **80 volunteer events**

Member Highlights: MCC AmeriCorps Members, Laura Heinlein and Joe Taft, began their term of service prior to the outset of COVID-19 and exemplify how members have adapted and preserved to continue meeting the environmental stewardship needs of Maine.



MCC Environmental Steward Laura Heinlein has ensured that the Cumberland County Soil and Water Conservation District's Soil Lead Awareness project has continued to progress amid the COVID-19 pandemic. The project was designed to engage Portland residents through a series of public community gardening events to raise awareness about lead contaminated soil through providing free soil testing. In light of physical distancing, Laura has used her creative thinking and networking skills fostered at MCC and the District to connect with communities about the high risk of lead contaminated soils. With many confined to the home and an increase in home gardening during the pandemic, raising awareness about lead in soils is more important than ever. Yet, bringing attention to vet another public health issue in the middle of a public health crisis has taught Laura the importance of respectful and delicate communication. Through connecting with local press, partnering with local organizations committed to promoting local agriculture, support from neighborhood organizations, and a social media campaign, Laura has connected with over 100 gardeners in Portland and collected 53 soil samples. Laura is

continuing to develop the project's outreach strategy, with particular focus on equity, in order to connect with gardeners from every community in Portland. The Soil Lead Awareness project has planted a life-long seed of interest in environmental justice that Laura looks forward to cultivating for the remainder of her term of service and beyond.

MCC Environmental Steward Joe Taft played a critical role in ensuring that the Maine Healthy Beaches program was able to begin beach water quality monitoring activities in 2020. Water quality monitoring conducted by the Maine Healthy Beaches Program relies on the involvement of over 100 volunteers with varying levels of environmental monitoring experience. Utilizing communication and volunteer engagement skills cultivated during time spent with MCC, Maine DEP, and other professional organizations, Joe was able to assist with 14 volunteer trainings and conducted 8 volunteer trainings without a supervisor's assistance. Joe's ability to communicate scientific methods and rationale to the general public ensured that all volunteers were trained in an effective, safe (socially distanced/small group size due to Covid-19), and timely fashion. In total, Joe was involved in the training of 67 Maine Healthy Beaches volunteers and was able to continue developing his public speaking, organization/time management, and volunteer management skills.
