Maine Service Fellows recruits individuals within 5 years of their higher education degree, so apply today if you want to make a meaningful difference in a small-town community's fight against climate change!

About You

To be a Maine Service Fellow, you must...

- Be at least 20 years of age and hold a college degree_(associates, bachelors, or graduate) by the start of their service term in January.
- Be eligible to work in the United States and pass a background check that includes a criminal history record check.
- Live in the community impacted by their project.
- Meet any project-specific qualifications.

How to Apply

Send a resume along with a cover letter expressing your interest and fit for a position in climate action, public service, and volunteerism to Kirsten Brewer at service.commission@maine.gov.

This fall, Volunteer Maine will post 5 new positions with a January start date. In the meantime, send your resume and cover letter to Kirsten. She will keep them on file and reach out to you when the specific positions and host sites are finalized.
